Chris says, "In this generative workshop, which focuses on poetry but should also be of interest to fiction and creative nonfiction writers, we'll explore the craft element of voice—creating a sense of a living personality behind our words.

We'll look at how voice can help us find our way into new writing, and how a well-crafted voice can help our writing come alive and leap from the page. We'll read poems by writers such as Donika Kelly, James Tate, and Camille T. Dungy, and examine the dazzling effects they achieve through voice.




## The LVW Book Group

# LVW Fall Event – "Using Both Sides of Your Brain to Write"

#### Recap of "Using Both Sides of Your Brain," with Alexander Wolff and Char Gardner



Alexander Wolff, author of *Endpapers: A Family Story of Books, War, Escape, and Home,* was our first speaker, addressing the "left brain" side of writing. He explained how he went about researching and writing *Endpapers: A Family Story of Books, War, Escape, and Home.* 

He took us on a thoughtful and detailed journey, sharing with us his process of research, interviews, and dedication to creating *Endpapers*. *He* explored with us the strategies and research techniques that any writer can use to help bring a memoir to life.

One of his admonitions was a simple one, but very important, "Write it down." He suggested that the belief that, "I'll remember that," is folly, indeed. He called it "the devil's whisper."



Wolff would find that luck too, played a large part in his process, as his ancestors were so-called packrats, saving photographs, letters, news articles, and more that he was able to use in his research. At the end of WWI, a man in a paper plant in Germany secretly explored bales of used paper before sending them to be pulped for reuse and in doing found an incredible treasure trove of war documents which he preserved until they could be properly dealt with.

Wolff explained that the workers at research facilities are usually willing and often eager to help people find the documents, books and papers they need for a writing project. There may be an element of patience and application submission, but that the resulting harvest is worth the work.

Wolf mentioned that one of the fringe benefits of such a journey is the discovery of previously unheard of stories, finding small notebooks, obscure documents and the voices of ancestors. "Reading in parallel" was a joyous and abundant by-product of his research; it was enjoyable to just "pull books and read them: histories, biographies, memoir, journals and even fiction."

Char Gardner was our "right brain' presenter, and her topic was, "Teaming up with Chance Similarities and Differences in Drawing and Writing."

She began by sharing a quote from Joseph Beuys, "Even if I write my name, I am drawing." That put a whole new spin on the verb 'to draw.'

Char likens her art to that of Stéphane Mallarmé, who says, "I draw the sensation of the thing and not the thing itself."

Char mentioned that drawing and writing have many things in common; some of them are: Observation, sensation, experiential/in the moment, embrace of uncertainty, revision and finally resolution... Or not. And Char said she was sure we could think of many others.

Then she shared two of her drawings with the group, and offered them as a prompt for writing. Her drawings are 22" x 30" and are oil on paper. The one on the left was dated October 5, 2023, and was called *Flanders Hill*. The drawing on the right was dated May 25, 2023 and was titled *Matteuccia Struthiopteris*. Char put them on the screen side by side and bid us to respond to one or the other or both in writing. We had about seven minutes to do this, and those who wanted to shared their responses. Celia, Gail, Amy, and Justine shared their writings with the group.

## **Kudos to Katherine Quimby Johnson**



Her debut novel *Telling Sonny* was published by Adelaide Books, New York in 2018. *Telling Sonny* is a coming of age novel set in the 1920s, when much of vaudeville had devolved into the Small Time. Not so for Faby Gauthier, a naïve girl from the small village of Enosburg Falls, Vermont. For Faby, the annual vaudeville show that comes to the village is worthy of the Great White Way itself. When she succumbs to the undeniable charms of Slim White, America's self-proclaimed Favorite Hoofer, Faby sets a course for her life she neither expected nor wanted.

When a loved one dies, the family will often turn to the photograph albums as an act of solace, to keep their loved one with them just a little while longer. *Grief Songs: Poems of Love & Remembrance* arose from that experience. Paul Stream Press, LLC (September 26, 2021) The collection opens with three free verse expressions of raw grief, followed by a series of photographs from the author's family album, each paired with a poem written in tanka. Taken together, they tell the story of a loving family lost. [Ed note: The tanka is a thirty-one-syllable poem, traditionally written in a single unbroken line. A form of waka, Japanese song or verse, tanka translates as "short song."]

Elizabeth Gauffreau writes fiction and poetry with a strong connection to family and place. She holds a BA in English/Writing from Old Dominion University and an MA in English/Fiction Writing from the University of New Hampshire. Her fiction publications include short stories in *Woven Tale Press, The Long Story, Soundings East, Ad Hoc Monadnock, Rio Grande Review, Blueline, Slow Trains, Hospital Drive*, and *Serving House Journal*, among others. Her poetry has appeared in *North of Oxford, The Writing on the Wall, The Larcom Review*, and *Natural Bridge*.

Liz grew up a child of the 1960s in northern New England before spending twenty years in the South as a Navy wife. After working for Granite State College in Concord, New Hampshire for eighteen years, she accepted a faculty position as Assistant Dean of Curriculum and Assessment at Champlain College Online in Burlington, Vermont. In addition to academic advising, teaching, and higher education administration, her professional background includes assessment of prior experiential learning for college credit. Liz lives in Nottingham, New Hampshire with her husband; their daughter has flown the nest to live in sunny California.

# Obituary: Marie Flaim Tedford, 1924-2023 (With permission from Seven Days)

Marie Adele Flaim Tedford, 99, beloved wife, mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt and dear friend, passed away on September 15 at the University of Vermont Medical Center in Burlington. She succumbed to a heart ailment that came on suddenly, after a full day spent in some favorite pastimes — animated conversation, dining out, walking in her Underhill Center neighborhood, and planning activities with friends and family. She is survived by her husband of 65 years, Walter "Ted" Tedford; son Thomas O'Brien and his wife, Linda; son Charles O'Brien; daughters Patricia Goudey O'Brien and Paula Diaco; nine beloved grandchildren and their spouses; 11 great-grandchildren; son-in-law Jonathan Draudt and Miya Cline; two nieces; and a cousin. She was predeceased by two daughters, Barbara-Jean O'Brien and Laurie Tedford, and her son-in-law Robert Diaco.

Marie was the second of four children born to Jenny Genantone Flaim and Charles Flaim in Fort Lee, N.J. She attended Catholic schools in Fort Lee and graduated from St. Cecilia High School in Englewood, N.J. She was a writer all of her life, publishing numerous articles for craft magazines in New Jersey and newspaper articles in Vermont. She published a children's book, *The Bearamores Visit the Badlands*, for an educational publisher, and she wrote six editions of *Collecting Books* with her daughter Pat for Random House's House of Collectibles. In 2019, Marie released a volume of short stories about growing up in Italian neighborhoods in New Jersey, *Nanny Goat Hill* from the Tamarac Press.

A lifelong lover of books, Marie was a founding member of the Vermont Antiquarian Booksellers Association. For decades, she conducted her business, Mountain Reverie Books, selling rare and antiquarian books from the small shop beside her house in Underhill Center.

In recent years, Marie enjoyed spending time with friends and family, especially enjoying a weekly gathering of writers from around the neighborhood in her adopted state. She never liked leaving Vermont, except to visit special people, and she would say about taking her leave now, "It was not my idea."
