10:15 WORKSHOP SESSIONS

Session A: Joy Cohen - Yoga and Creativity: The Art and Practice of Breath, Flow, and Creative Expression

Have you ever carved out a time to create, and found yourself stuck? Ever taken a yoga class and experienced that feeling, that zone you enter—centered, calm, and less full of negative mind chatter? Please join me for a unique experience in which we combine a Gentle Yoga practice with a writing workshop. Class will include a series of breath-synchronized easy, gentle movement. We will set an intention for our writing, and our practice will become an exploration of how yoga can re-energize you physically and also help you achieve mental clarity and focus to enhance your creative process.

Session B: Amy Braun - Collage Your Focus

In this session, I will share my passion for collage and how it has helped sharpen my observation and writing skills. Creating a collage is similar to building a sentence, paragraph, or overall idea. In this workshop, we will take some time to observe the natural world and create a collage and a detailed sentence, poem, or paragraph. At the end of the session, there will be time to share our work with one another.

Session D: Susan Agatha Davis - Info Dumps and Other Precarious Problems

How to avoid info dumps/backstory swamps in the first chapter, when and how to avoid prologs, how to provide backstories that don't stifle the plot, and how to determine when "show, don't tell" doesn't matter.

Session E: Gail Wind - Use Excel to maintain research and avoid writing blunders

To keep track of mileage of travelers, ages of your characters, when they get or quit a job, get married, are born or die, use Excel. It is easy to create and edit and you don't have to keep referring to your written novel. Make sure you know when your characters met, etc.

Session F: Carl Nyberg - Creating "New England Screenwriters Network"

In this session people interested in screenwriting will be invited to discussed what League of Vermont Writers can do to support people interested in screenwriting, including movies, TV and playwriting. Carl Nyberg will use his experience as a member of Chicago Screenwriters Network as a starting point for discussing what support for screenwriters could be.

Session G: Beth Malow - Do you want to self-publish your book? Strategies for success

Each year, about 300 million books are self-published. Self-publishing your book gives you a lot of flexibility in terms of timeline, content, and marketing. Spreading the word about your book can be challenging yet rewarding, especially for first timers. We will discuss the nuts and bolts of self-publishing and share best practices. Those who have recently self-published a book, are in the process of self-publishing, or simply want to hear more are welcome to attend!

Session H: Louella (Ellie) Bryant - Hook, Logline, and Stinker: The toughest challenge for book marketing

Once you have a complete manuscript, you must shift your mindset from telling your story to the hard part—selling your story. Attracting readers involves some of the most challenging writing you'll do—developing key selling points in three formats: the hook that makes you look, the logline that distills the story, and the brief description that convinces the reader to make the purchase. We'll also discuss the author bio, tags, keywords, and the all-important author website. N.B.: Even if you're still in the writing process, this workshop will help you define the heart of your story.

Session I: Alyssa Berthiaume - Keeping Up, Staying Relevant, and Making Your Book Evergreen-A Mastermind Session for Published Authors

In this session, published authors will gather to discuss and brainstorm ways to keep their books relevant in the marketplace regardless of the date of their publication. This will include discussing the possibilities and potential of developing your online presence and digital marketing. The facilitator will customize the session to those who attend and guide the conversation with prompted questions. She'll leverage her experience as an independent author and business owner in the ways of online presence and platform and digital marketing to support published authors questions about the current online marketing landscape. This is a masterminding session not a formal presentation. Please bring a notebook to capture the ideas relevant to you and your book. No handout will be provided.



An Unusual Indie Book in Hawaii

Take a stroll down Bethel Street in Chinatown and you'll stumble upon a large glass window display featuring an eclectic mix of gold alien figures, mannequins, surf boards, flying saucers and a skeleton floating midair over a pile of skulls with UFO light beams painted in the backdrop.

There's no store sign installed, but inside is a treasure trove of carefully curated books and vinyl records related to all things "deep, dark, weird or hard" — titles ranging from science fiction to horror, true crime, classics, surfing and other edgy subgenres.

Welcome to Skull-Face Books and Vinyl, one of the newest independent bookstores to emerge on Oahu.

"There's just nothing that feels like a bookstore," said Josh Spencer, co-owner of Skull-Face. "You know, you're surrounded by so much knowledge and so many stories, like there's nothing else where you can go, where you're kind of bombarded by all this visual stimulation and mental stimulation and spiritual stimulation."

An Amazing Story of the Little Town that Could – The Whitefield Library of Maine by Gail Wind

There are two Whitefield Libraries that have been in the news in the last few years. One is in Whitefield New Hampshire. The one I want to share my interest in is a former Grand Old Army Hall, turned Grange Hall, at 1 Arlington Lane, Whitefield, ME 04353. It is an eye-catching, two-story, yellow beacon on top of a hill in Whitefield.

I read an online article from *Brown Alumni Magazine* "One Grange Hall, Two Alums, and 9,000 Books *The birth of a place for books and community, in rural Maine.*" by Catherine Newman / <u>April—May 2023</u> https://www.brownalumnimagazine.com/articles/2023-04-26/the-whitefield-library-maine



It gave some interesting background. Ann Weiss said, "The creation of this small-but-mighty rural library has had an outsize impact on the town..." Seems a little second grader was not happy that there was no library to go to in the summer. Specifically, he wanted a library open when the school library was closed, because "in the summer it's kind of boring here," he had explained. The local Grange Hall was in kind of poor shape, but it offered space for a warm weather library, and for a couple of years, that fit the bill just fine.

"There was no heat or insulation, so they wouldn't be able to stay open in the winter, but local folks donated books and furnishings, and a warm-weather library was born." Three years later Covid hit and the library had to close. The two Brown alums and two other friends were the "library group' set

about to get a library grant from a local bank. They bought the Grange hall. Nicknaming themselves, "The Geezer Gang," they set about to restore the building.

They stored the shelves they had gotten from a laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine in the barn of one of the gang members. They've done a tremendous amount of work on the place and the work is ongoing. The library now has heating and cooling. They've received donations from many sources, including Stephen King!

"Without the library," Margot says of the Grange Hall, "this lovely old building would have continued falling into ruin. The library has been created by volunteers out of nothing—with donated books, free labor, and love."

From what was a fairly dismal looking structure, with peeling shingles, peeling paint inside, and peeling wallpaper, the photos of the reconstruction and the final project are truly stunning. The "Geezer Gang" and local volunteers did plumbing, wiring, flooring, cabinetry in the kitchen and hundreds of hours of drywall work and painting. They dug French drains around the foundation to create runoff and keep the foundation dry.

In 2022 the Whitefield Library Association received grant funding from the Lincoln County Fund and the Raymond McKinley Rideout Jr. Marguerite Waterman Rideout Fund to support ongoing work on the library. March 3, 2025, they announced the completion of the second-floor renovation! Writing Challenge:

This challenge is open to members and friends of LVW. Write alone or with a partner.

THESE ARE THE PARAMETERS OF THE CHALLEGE:

- 1. Characters You must have **One main, two supporting.** (cast of minor characters is optional)
- 2. Choose the time frame a few minutes, a day, a week, a year.
- 3. Specify the historic time period: Now, future, past up to you.
- 4. Keep it on this planet. (Next challenge will be 'outer limits.')
- 5. Max word count 2500 words!

Here's the challenge:

Your main character sees a knothole in the woodwork (you pick where). He/she/they discovers that by pushing a finger into the middle of the knothole, they can enlarge it (as much as they want). What do they find beyond? Write that story.
